


Forging Wew Traditions

A Unique Two-Story Home Is a Fine Fit for Its Empty-Nest Owners

Potted Italian cypress trees wrapped with strands of red berries, paired with poinsettias and little log reindeer, flank the wood-banded glass entry doors.

WHILE MANY EMPTY NESTERS DOWNSIZE their housing when their children are finally "flying" on their own, others, whose kids come home now and again, do just the opposite. A Phoenix couple falls in the latter category. Working with interior designer Sue Calvin and builder Rod Cullum, they built a dream house that fits their personal style and grown-up wishes.

Their new two-story home, located in a mountain-surrounded, gated community, is about as spacious as the last one but richer in adult amenities, such as an elevator and an underground wine cellar. Downsizing did occur as far as site size, but other niceties make up for it, according to the wife. "The patios have beautiful fountains and great outdoor living spaces," she says.

The house is "integrated into a mountain," explains Cullum, and it was oriented to capture views of Camelback Mountain, the city of Phoenix and more. He calls the residence, with its man cave and unique layout, an "adult house" that truly fits the homeowners' lifestyle.

The main living areas—including the great room, open-concept kitchen, dining room, master suite and library/man cave—are situated on the second floor. It is from this top story—where

most daily living takes place—that the homeowners have the best mountain and city views, explains Calvin. She worked out the residence's interior floor plan, was involved in the interior architecture, and planned the decor.

The first floor contains guest suites, the wife's office and other areas. When adult children visit, they occupy the guest quarters. Says their mom, "They easily settled into their new rooms," which are more luxurious than what they had before and also have en suite baths.

"They do use every room in the house," says Calvin of the homeowners. She describes the interiors as Euro Country with a little bit of a sophisticated edge. The dining room, decorated for the holidays, displays that edge: Here, classic Queen Anne chairs mesh well with a large Contemporary mixed-media painting by Dirk De Bruycker. The master bedroom, gracefully dressed, gains drama from a life-size Modern figural clay sculpture by Mark Chatterley.

Thanks to Calvin and the elves from Christmas by Ronaldo, who gave the home its holiday vibe, the owners are loving their dream digs and happily forging new traditions there.


